SHOW REGULATIONS

1. ACCEPTANCE OF ENTRIES

The Society reserves the right to accept or reject any entry considered unsuitable for display without assigning any reason. "All Royal Hobart Show entrants are bound by all policies, procedures, rules and regulations of the Royal Agricultural Society of Tasmania. These may be amended at the discretion of the Board and Chief Executive Officer of RAST."

2. ENTRIES

Entries must be listed on the entry form in numerical class order. If an exhibitor has more than one entry in a class, each entry must be listed separately. Please see specific class for further information.

No exhibit is to be entered in more than one class. No portion of a collection can compete as a single exhibit.

Any article having won a 1st prize in a section at a Royal Hobart Show cannot enter again. All work is to be the bona fide work of the exhibitor and not more than three years old and should not be commercially available.

During the Show, all exhibits will be in the custody of the Creative Crafts Committee and must not be touched or handled by any unauthorised person. Whilst the greatest care will be taken with exhibits, the Society will not be responsible for any accident, loss or damage. Exhibits are entered at the sole risk of the exhibitor.

Exhibit numbers will be issued via email and these must be fixed securely to exhibits prior to delivery to the venue.

For exhibits constructed from fibre or fabric tickets should be attached with safety pins (not pins) and a description of each article must be included on the back of the exhibit ticket.

Some food classes require a description of ingredients on the reverse of exhibit ticket i.e. fruit, vegetable etc. Articles must not be worn or used prior to exhibiting.

Articles must not be entered in the open section if a class exists for that article.

Name / Signatures must be covered by exhibitor.

Articles entered in an incorrect class will be transferred to the correct class.

Novice classes are those who have not previously won a first prize in a similar class at Royal Hobart Show.

The Society will endeavour to display all entries, however not all items may be displayed due to the limited display area. Exhibits may be used for promotion.

3. JUDGING

Only catalogued entries will be judged. Judges can withhold prizes in any class where the exhibits are not deemed to be of prize winning quality. Exhibits may be moved class if the judge sees fit. The judges' decision is final.

4. COLLECTION OF PRIZE MONEY

Prize money will be deposited via direct deposit into your nominated Bank Account on the entry form All unclaimed prize money will be deemed to be a donation to the RAST if not claimed or, in the case of cheques issued, cashed within 180 days of the issue date.

Line cake tins carefully and remove lining paper for presentation. Cakes must be level (no hollows or depressions) and of even colour. Hollows or depression can indicate insufficient cooking.

ICED & DECORATED CAKES

Originality will be taken into account and must be the entrants own work

Ribbon and wire are permissible in these classes. Cleats must be placed on the bottom of the board to enable exhibit to be moved easily.

Boards must not exceed 38cm in diameter or 40cm in height, on all decorated cakes unless otherwise stated. The following are not permitted: pins, wires that penetrate the covering of the cake, inedible ornaments, decorations or metallic paint.

Non-toxic gold and silver may be used to highlight a name or small feature. Dummies may be used to substitute cake unless otherwise stated.

This section is judged by Australian National Judges to ensure that food safe practices are adhered to.

Class 33 OPEN - Special Occasion Cake eg Christmas, Birthday or Wedding. Must include a greeting.

May be one or more tiers. Base board not to exceed 38cm in diameter and height not to exceed 40cm when measured from the table.

Class 34 Open – Sculptured Cake – 70% of exhibit must be cake. Exhibit must be carved to shape and not made in a specific model shaped tin.

Base/ Presentation board or drape to fit within a 40 cm square.

Class 35 Cake Topper - Competitors choice. Must not exceed 20cm square or cube.

CROCHET

Articles must not have been worn or used.

Shank buttons, ribbon, beads and twisted cord are not permitted in baby's wear. Flat seams for baby. Exhibits **not** to be mounted. Knitted bands not permitted. Correct and even tension with patterns matching at all seams. Shawls and garments (where appropriate) must be blocked. Please nominate fibre or medium used.

Wool, wool blend, silk, fancy cotton, crochet cotten or any modern yarn may be used.

Blocking - When pressing/blocking dampen and place each piece on a padded surface with wrong side of work facing you. Pin to size and allow to dry, or cover with a damp cloth and lightly press. Wait till the fabric has cooled before removing the pins.

Do not press acrylic.

KNITTING

Guidelines

Articles must not have been worn or used. Shank buttons, ribbon, beads and twisted cord are not permitted in baby's wear. Flat seams for baby.

Correct and even tension with patterns matching at all seams. Shawls and garments (where appropriate) must be blocked. Knitting should be finished without knots and wool joined at seams with no ends.

No Crochet or lace trims allowed on knitted articles

Blocking - When pressing/blocking dampen and place each piece on a padded surface with wrong side of work facing you. Pin to size and allow to dry, or cover with a damp cloth and lightly press. Wait till the fabric has cooled before removing the pins.

Do not press acrylic or knitted bands.

Please nominate fibre used.

PATCHWORK/QUILTING

Must be constructed from fibre. Must have loops or sleeves for hanging. i.e. cushions, quilts, tableware. Details to be considered when judging: even joins, general finish, neatness and cleanliness.

Traditional: Design features traditional patchwork blocks, techniques, settings and finishing, appliqué crazy patchwork and whole cloth quilts are included.

Non-traditional: Design is a deviation from traditional patchwork using contemporary design and/or techniques, settings and finishing; appliqué whole cloth quilts are included.

- Class 89 Traditional Patchwork- Large Advanced-Hand stitched

Traditional patchwork can be simple or complex, but it is usually made up of many repetitions of the same block and orderly rows. In Wholecloth quilts, the quilting is featured on a plain background.

<u>EMBROIDERY</u>

All exhibits to be done by hand and have been completed within the last 3 years. Technique must illustrate good knowledge of stitches. Choice of fabric and threads must be compatible with the design. Presentation of the piece must be well balanced in design and aligned with matt board and frame.

Framing, where applicable, will be taken into consideration when the exhibit is judged. Work is to be clean and well presented. Judges will look for: - Worn threads, missed stitches, uneven tension, visible design marks, visible carriage of threads, inconsistent direction of stitches in cross stitch items, cushions poorly filled. If in a frame, it is the exhibitor's responsibility to ensure external dimensions of frames meet class size criteria. All exhibits framed or unframed, not to exceed 60cmx90cm. If in a frame, please include a hanging device at the back of your work. If unframed edges must be neatly finished eg: hemmed or stretched over foam core/mounting board.

Class 95 Cross Stitch on Aida, Linen or Even weave fabric - Not to exceed 20cm x 20cm Cross Stitch on Aida, Linen or Even weave fabric. Must not exceed 20cm x 20cm.

No production pieces will be accepted. Items to be made from at least 90% sewing by hand or machine. Items can be pressed for presentation.

Details that are to be considered when judging include: seams, hems, fastenings, general finish, neatness, cleanliness, and wearability.

Machining must be uniform, well placed with functional zippers, plackets, overlaps even in width, evenly stitched and neatened both ends.

Buttonholes are to be evenly spaced, neat, durable and suitable for garment type. Degree of difficulty will be considered when being judged.

Embroidery on garments, e.g. appliqué, smocking, etc. will only be assessed as appropriateness to the garment, neatness, and degree of skill.

Suggestions for accessories may include handmade bags, head decorations, ties, jewellery designed to be wearable, fashion shoes covered with material to be worn as designer accessories and scarves and hats (other than knitted)

Weaving Guidelines

Hand spun yarn will be judged on the quality of spinning of the chosen fibre. Name the fibre and how it was prepared. Skeins to be tied neatly in four places using matching yarn. Information to be written on label as required. Labels must be attached to a single strand of yarn so that skein is not damaged when judges open the skein.

Weaving – pay particular attention to maintaining a consistent weave with neat edges. Use a tag to explain any unusual techniques or fibre choices.
